

Rev. Jean **Saddington**

My maternal Grandfather used to say that bread is the 'staff of life'. He died when I was very young but even as a child I think I always knew that he was talking about bread being a 'staple' – a food that so long as it's available we are able to live. My Grandfather came from a fairly well off family of saddlers so I doubt that they were ever without bread on the table but he would have acknowledged, as a Christian, that there were many for whom that was not the case and also that we weren't just talking about physical hunger but spiritual hunger too, not just physical bread but Jesus, the bread of life. My Grandfather would have known his bible well and the many references to bread (the word bread appears 271 times in the bible - 83 of which are in the New Testament) and he would have understood bread as a metaphor for the life-giving grace of God.

There is something about food, about being fed, about eating with one another, that is deeply spiritual. Sadly, because of COVID, there is no Parish Harvest Supper again this year but when were able to have our Harvest Suppers we celebrated being together, being a community, being a family under God, being friends with one another. Our friends and neighbours prepared the food and served it. Theirs, yours, is an act of love towards each one of us and for that we can be thankful.

But even as we are being fed, both spiritually and physically, we know there are many others in this country and around the world who will go hungry today. That is why, at Harvest time in particular, we offer some of our food, some of our money and some of our time to help feed others. For us the harvest is plentiful and so we can be generous in our giving.

As we celebrate our Harvest Festivals let us give thanks to God for the simple things that sustain us - the love of our family, friendships, God's beautiful creation, bread - the staff of life and God's unconditional love given for us in his son Jesus Christ our Lord - the bread of life.


The Winterbourne Community Trust Annual Meeting, postponed from September, will now be held on Sunday 10th October at 6pm in the Village Hall. All are welcome.

After a reduced 2020 season we returned in 2021 with a full season of games across all formats.

It was certainly worth the wait with the club achieving one of its best achievements.

Leading the way was the club's First Team who finished third in the competitive Dorset Premier League, their best ever position. On the way the team won games against top opposition and up until the last game of the season remained in contention for the title. In their final game they hit an astonishing 436 runs - a club record.

Meanwhile our Second and Evening teams put in robust performances in their respective leagues.

Equally it was wonderful to see youth cricket returning to the ground.

For the early years there were the All Stars and Dynamo programmes, attracting both girls and boys whilst the under 15s managed an undefeated season, with cup success for both the under 13s and under 11s.

Our youngsters again featured heavily in the adult teams, with often at least eight of the first team

comprising of home-grown talent. There was further representation at county level...

Wellies on...

As the rainy season approaches the Martinstown Flood Volunteers have started work on some particularly overgrown stretches of the western end of the stream where the water had become practically invisible. You may have noticed our work.

Dorset Council's reduced mowing policy has not helped with the stream's visibility, resulting in a bit of a hazard for walkers and motorists alike. It's still a work in progress, but the volunteers achieved some satisfying clearance in early September.

Time is of the essence when it comes to stream clearing. There is an autumn ecology window of just two months, September & October, minimising



the risk of disruption to wildlife. So we find we are always up against the clock trying to achieve the maximum clearage, in the minimum of time. (Without exhausting the volunteers, none of us are getting any younger!)

Dorset Council's investigation into previous flooding identified lack of capacity in the village as one of the two main causes of the flooding of village homes. Hence, we, as do the other upstream villages, try our level best to ensure the stream is in a good state for water to pass right through the village, unhindered from obstructing branches and other matter.



Many lengths of the stream have heavy growth in the main channel which needs to be cleared by hand, or it leads to mud bank development; which in turn provides opportunity for further plant colonisation. Collectively this quickly turns the base of what should be a sparkling chalk stream into a muddy brook!

So please join the Flood Volunteering group, it's very informal, volunteers only do what they are comfortable with doing. There are no committees or bureaucracies; it's simply a group of caring villagers who get together under their own steam, mostly in the autumn, to help reduce the flood risk to Martinstown village homes.

We have a list of stream (riparian) owners with mobility problems who need help with clearing their part of the stream. We would really love to do as much as we can for these villagers but are very short of volunteers. The main workforce of the group is half a dozen villagers who already do the bulk of the work, none of which are teenagers! Are you able to volunteer to be called upon to help clear a neighbour's section of the stream? Perhaps you have a teenager you can volunteer?

If you are able to help please contact me & I will tell you when next to break out your wellies & join us.

The MILEATERS out and about...

...Cattistock walk - Martin & Lesley Usherwood

On the hottest day of August, so far, 26 Mileaters ventured out to walk in the environs of Cattistock. The number equalled the record but the accompanying 8 dogs was a new record. I am sure the number of participants was swelled by the recommendation for the Fox and Hounds pub by Nick Priddle.

I had only been to Cattistock once before and that was to visit the famous "Dorset Knob Throwing Festival" sadly, this has moved to a more easily accessible site since then. Until that visit I didn't know there were so many things one could do with a Dorset Knob. Having tried to eat one I think the best thing to do with them is throw them!

A gentle contour upwards from Cattistock led to the Wessex Ridgeway, a panoramic view was enjoyed by all. I had kept the next bit as a surprise. Who knew that grown men would come here to fly their model aeroplanes? Whilst we sort the appropriate permisions to cross the runway (a bit like Gibraltar) we were entertained to an aerial display by one of the owners. Fearing an attack by our dogs on one of the planes we quickly moved on into the wheat field next door. (I suppose it would have been a dogfight?)

Further on along the Ridgeway a convenient place was found for a Coffee stop. Imagine the disappointment felt by some when a 4x4 appeared on the horizon looking every bit like an ice cream van only to turn out to be the local gamekeeper checking the area. (Curses foiled again!)

One of the challenges to leaders these days is to find a few feet of footpath that has not been walked by our esteemed leader Nick. I think this walk managed to achieve the objective for about 20 metres but I don't think he had seen the aeroplanes before, so iob done.

The return leg was via Maiden Newton. Here we were informed that the railway was only there because it was too expensive to drive a tunnel through to Cerne Abbas. We found the first of three churches which marked the turning point for home and lunch. Our path was now along the Macmillan Trail which follows the valley of the River Frome back past Chilfrome to Cattistock. The dogs had a mad five minutes splashing inthe water and then soaking everyone who happened to be in the wrong place come 'shaking' time. I was disappointed that none of the group was tempted to use the rope swings despite earlier intrigue, assurances and vague promises.

This part of the journey sees three churches within a mile of each other. Each one having distinctive features to its neighbour whether this be 'No pews', extreme gargoyles, William Morris windows, fresh water spring in the church yard, an exceedingly tall tower or the largest font pedestal I have seen being several metres tall and needing a few strong people to lift it by pulley.

We were very glad to reach the pub for lunch and ignored the locals who asked if we were a coach party. "No we are Mileater from Martinstown". I was amazed how quickly the food was served the quality and quantity being superb. I think every one of the 26 would recommend a visit. Tip: Take a designated driver as the Beer is very good also.
