

I feel your pain, your loneliness Yet our love remains my dear Although no longer in your sight My spirit is still near.


So share with me my sweetheart As you journey on in life I will be there, and sharing In your worries, joys and strife.

Martinstown's very own Man from U.N.C.L.E. kept our audience gripped throughout his talk on the 15th January about Counter - Terrorism.

23 years of Alan Jenkins's career with the Police was spent here in Dorset and a substantial part of that was focused on keeping our society safe from the very real and very alarming threat of terrorism.

Alan shared with us the extent of that threat and how terrorists and potential terrorists are pursued, with dozens of attacks nationally - and some locally - having been foiled in recent years. We heard about the work done to help protect life in the event of attacks and how we are now better prepared to minimise their impact. Crucially, huge investment is also put into preventing potential terrorists being converted to a violent cause.

This was a thoughtful, highly professional


analysis that threw light on the historical, cultural and social drivers of terrorism, which was somehow both profoundly thought-provoking and at the same time entertaining. Importantly, we came away alerted to how to spot where dangers may lie and how we should act on them.

Without exaggeration, it was a tremendous talk, fluidly and engagingly delivered, made all the more real to us by Alan sharing his personal and very direct experience and we look forward to having him back before long to share other insights from his intriguing career.

Next up on the 19th February, we're looking forward to the Gold Club talk on "Gardening Folklore". Never say the Valley Club's interests aren't varied!



The Winterborne St Martin Parish Council meets on the fourth Thursday of the month, we were excused a meeting in December. The minutes of the January meeting will be available for our meeting on the 22nd February 2024, meetings start at 7pm, they are held in the Church in Martinstown. or as paper copies on the Parish Council notice board in the bus stop by the Martinstown Village Hall. In addition the Parish Council news is published on the website and the Martinstown Facebook page.

2024 is a Parish Council election year, if there are more nominees than places there will be an election if there are less there will be no election. The Council would welcome new Councillors, if you are interested get in touch with the Clerk. If you want more information about the work of a councillor or the election process just get in touch:

The Council has a new Clerk and her name is Victoria Badman. Victoria has settled in well and working to support all of the Council and in

particular our Chair Mark Pemberton.

The Council is continuing to lobby Wessex Water about the inadequacies of the sewage system running through Martinstown. The sewage system fails when the water table rises and the ground water leaks into the pipes of the sewage system. We hope continually lobbying and raising concerns we can be sure Wessex Water are aware of our issues and that they will continue to repair the leaky pipe work.

The repair to the stonework of the Sheep Washing Pool is nearly complete, the final work will be done when there is a little less river water in the South Winterborne. There will be a meeting shortly with our grass cutting contractor if there are issues you would like the Council to raise please do drop Victoria an email so we can raise it at the review meeting.

The Council continues to work on the ownership of the Reading Room at the east end of the village to ensure benefit to the parish. It's a surprisingly detailed and technical investigation but if you want to know more please come to the next Parish Council meeting. You will be most welcome!

Winterbourne Abbas & Steepleton Parish Council

Hello – we have decided to use the Valley and Valance Magazine to share with you what your Parish Council is focusing on in respect of our two villages. This will be the first of a regular bi-monthly update going forwards.

Our main area of focus in 2023 has been:

Copyhold Lane, Winterbourne Abbas: In June, together with local villagers and landowners, we received a notice from Dorset Council relating to an application made in 2005 to "upgrade" this public bridleway to a Byway Open to All Traffic (BOAT). This application has taken an incredible 18 years to reach the "top of the pile".

Whilst a BOAT is now not permitted, we understand that a possible outcome is a change to a "restricted byway" which is very similar to a bridleway but horse drawn (not motorized) vehicles would be allowed to use it in addition to walkers, cyclists and horse riders. Dorset Council have undertaken extensive historic research right back in the 1800's to back up this possible outcome.

Along with the landowner and many locals, we made a formal objection in August based on evidence, local memories and our own research. We also asked Dorset Council to rule the application null and void as the historical maps and record extracts used were incorrect. If the application is passed, we will object to the order and the matter would be finally be decided at a public inquiry. We should like to thank local residents, Chris Loder MP, Roland Tarr (Dorset councillor) and the landowner for their assistance and support.

National Highways (A35): We had a "walk through meeting" with the new route manager during the summer and we are now getting far better response to the various issues. At long last work on the highway ditch at the rear of the Steepleton Water houses has started. The pavement along the forecourt of the filling station is going to be resurfaced. Highway drains have been cleared and further investigations are being carried out. We understand that funding is in place for average speed cameras to be installed in the A35 villages although we have not been advised when they will be operational in Abbas.

We have joined the newly formed A35 Parishes Group and attended their first meeting in the autumn. The group will gather information on the mainly common issues relating to villages on this busy trunk road and will hopefully have greater influence on National Highways than individual parishes.

Flooding: Prolonged rainfall during the last months of the year caused flooding of roads and surcharging of drains in both parishes but as far as we are aware, no serious property flooding. The stream in Steepleton was cleared by the parish council in October and some areas by volunteers in Abbas. National Highways have given an undertaking to carry this out in Abbas in the future once the water levels have reduced. Sandbags stocks are being replenished when required.

Wessex Water: Following a meeting with their staff in the summer, we continue to correspond with Wessex Water regarding the main sewer that runs from Abbas via Steepleton to the east end of Martinstown where it is pumped up to Dorchester. Winterbourne Abbas, like Martinstown, suffers from surcharging of the sewers by surface water. The flooding at the end of the year completely submerged sections of the sewer.

Bus Shelters and village seats: The bus shelters and village seats in both villages were refurbished during the summer months. Although Steepleton no longer has a bus service, school children still use this shelter and the village noticeboards are also in these shelters. Battery PIR lights have been installed

Speed Indicator Device (SID): Our solar powered SID in Steepleton continues to work well. A possible new site between the road junctions at Steepleton Ponds at the east end of the village is being tested by Dorset Council's speed awareness team. The SID is moved by volunteers between the two sites every 6 weeks.

Defibrillator: Our defibrillator located at the service station in Winterbourne Abbas is regularly checked and the national database updated.

Website: We update our noticeboards in the bus shelters and website on a regular basis. The website can be accessed via Dorsetforyou by entering https://www.winterbourneabbassteepleton-pc.gov.uk/home

Meetings: We meet on the third Monday every two months starting at 7.00pm, in the rear room of the Coach House Inn, Winterbourne Abbas. Residents are very welcome to attend and raise any issues that the Parish Council should be made aware of.





The MILEATERS out and about...

After days of icy weather and continual rain it was an especially resilient and hearty group of ten Mileaters and three dogs who set out on a six mile walk one Tuesday in early December. And how glad we all were that we made the effort. Because it really was not as muddy as feared and it was just very good to be out walking again after far too many days stuck indoors.

We parked at in the car park of beautiful Athelhampton and after crossing the road turned up the lane beside the small church there and climbed steadily through beech and oak woodland to fields with beautiful views down the valley to Tincleton. We stopped by a small poignant stone monument in memory of one of the sons of the owners of nearby Clyffe House, killed in France in 1940.

Re-entering woodland we followed a broad track through woodland for two miles, finally taking a left which took us down through the tall conifers of Southover woods and heath to join a track which, after fields and a long sunken track (which is in late spring has its sides covered in wild flowers) reaches Park Farm House and a pretty walk by the river to return to the church.

Lunch was at Athelhampton where we were welcomed and quickly served with hot drinks and tasty food.


Choral Services and Musical Events at St Peter's Church, Dorchester during February

Martinstown Circle Supper group has been raising money for charity through hosting suppers and organising fund raising events since 2016.

Last year our chosen charity was Dorset Family Counselling Trust and as well as the suppers we organised a clothes swap, an auction and an Abba evening. The 'Right to Grow' in Hull

Hull City Council unanimously adopted a motion to give local community groups, charities and neighbours a formalised 'right to grow' on public land. The council will produce a map of the land it owns that is suitable for growing on and will support people who want to grow food on it to overcome practical obstacles such as insurance and irrigation. Helping with food resilience, growing locally saves on transportation and is wonderful for community building.

RSPB

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds is running a 2 year pilot scheme giving free entry to 16 – 24 year olds. The RSPB has about 200 reserves and the average entrance fee is £6. The Fairfield Ash by Martin Usherwood

We moved into Fairfield at the end of May 2015. Those of you who were residents then will remember that the frontage was all wall and large fence panels. We parked our cars on the tarmac and grassed area. After a week we received a letter telling us that we were upsetting some of the residents but this could be easily remedied had we a mind too. Not wishing to upset our neighbours or incur costs we chose to create a driveway.

In order to achieve this, we would have to take down the Ash tree at the front of the property. The tree however, had a Tree Preservation Order from the 70's. The Ash had very large and heavy branches, 10m plus in length which overhung the road, our garage and a well-used footpath. The tree's trunk divided into three sections just six feet off the ground and in high winds it flexed causing low down stress fracturing.

We applied to have the tree felled. The tree seemed to sense our plans and decided to seek revenge. We woke up one morning to find that a 3m section of wall had been pushed over by the roots. Our application was turned down and we were told to re-build the wall around the roots, being careful not to damage them. Six months later we received a decision which upheld the original decision. The tree punished us by separating the joints and bending pipes in our mains water supply requiring a new system to be installed.

We were given permission to cut back 20% of the length. Our tree surgeon duly undertook the work and reduced the length by 2m. I kept the branches to be used as firewood in the future. A letter arrived from WDDC telling us that there had been a report of a breach of planning permission. A Senior Officer came out to make an inspection and gain evidence for possible prosecution. I was able to show him the 2m long branches. He picked up one which was over 3m long but soon put it down when I pointed out it was Silver Birch! He left telling us that he would write to us soon to give us his decision. We are still waiting to know if we are to be prosecuted.

It appeared the tree had forgiven us and liked its new haircut. The tree was gaining a well-rounded shape once again. It was a few months later that we first noticed a sizeable branch at the top of the tree looked in a poor state. Later, the extremities began to lose their leaves early and it peppered the driveway with small twigs. Our suspicions were confirmed by a Tree Surgeon and a Tree Officer, the tree had Ash Dieback. If left, the disease can spread to nearby trees and the wood becomes brittle. If it reaches this stage Tree Surgeons refuse to climb trees because of the danger. The tree had to come down as sadly it was dying.

Our Tree Surgeon did a good job taking down the tree to ground level. By counting the annual rings, I was able to work out the age of the tree which turned out to be 69yrs old. The house was built in 1951 replacing the row of cottages that burned down a few years previously. I met a Mr Ralls, who on the night of the fire he was thrown from an upstairs window into the arms of his older brother. I was able to supply him with photos and information from Margaret's book.

Back to the tree. We hired a digger and a stump grinder to remove the soil from around the tree and grind the exposed roots. The digger did a good job in removing several tonnes of soil and exposing the roots. We had absolutely no idea that the root would be so large. It was 2m in height and 3m in diameter. I tried hitting the stump with a 1kg maul. The tree had other ideas rebounding the strike, nearly catching me on the head. The hired stump grinder took one look at the stump and gave up.

I was finding it difficult to work on the front because of the well intentioned and freely given advice from passers-by. This ranged from "You'll never shift that", "Have you thought of copper nails", "Try Creosote", "Try Round Up". To our absolute horror eight people genuinely suggested we use dynamite to blow up the stump! We instead engaged Andrew, a Kiwi, who was confident that he could do the job. His machine came on the back of a car trailer and was another ferocious beast with a huge power unit. I went back inside to finish my breakfast only to be shaken when he started up the big diesel engine. The funny thing was that the 'monster' was remotely controlled by a small controller the size of a Kit Kat. It soon made mincemeat of the tree but the tree had not finished yet having one last laugh at our expense. We were left with a small mountain of mulch several tonnes in size. We mulched our own beds with a good layer but we were still left with tonnes of mulch. This had to be removed before reconstruction work could begin.

Along came the good people of Martinstown, the Dynamiters, the Copper Nailers and the Creosoters, with their bags, wheelbarrows, car boots and trailers. Within a few days it was gone. I pitied one couple who came to fill several bags just as the heavens opened. So, the non-diseased part of the tree has been put to good use. Some of the wood was donated to be made into objects to be sold for charity. As for the majority of the logs we are sitting here now in front of a roaring fire, beating back the best that Storm Ciaran can throw at us. These are some of the most expensive logs we have ever burned. (don't ask how much all of the above cost) We are sure we can hear each log laughing as it disappears up the chimney.
